


Of Price and Worth

From the West Manse

One of the things I enjoy about learning other languages is discovering words or phrases which have no direct equivalent in English but which describe a situation or feeling or experience which I recognise. Some of these words seem so perfect that they acquire a life outside their original language.

Take 'Hygge', for example. This Danish word for the pleasant, intimate feeling associated with sitting around a fire in the winter with close friends has become very popular in recent years in non-Danish speaking blogs, books, and lifestyle guides.

Others are less familiar. I discovered a new Scots one the other day for example, which I certainly need: 'tartle'. This apparently describes the 'panicky hesitation just before you have to introduce someone whose name you can't quite remember.'

Some other useful ones I discovered are: 'Greng-jai' (Thai) which is the feeling you get when you don't want someone to do something for you because it would be a pain for them. Or 'Boketto' (Japanese) - which is defined as 'gazing vacantly into the distance without thinking'.

Then there's 'Mamihlapinatapai' (which fortunately I don't have to try to pronounce out loud). This word, in the Yaghan language of Tierra del Fuego, describes 'that special look shared between two people, when both are wishing that the other would do something that they both want, but neither want to do.'

How much more evocative is that than 'shy'?

I can't help but wonder if finding the right words to describe the experience of Pentecost was a challenge for Luke, the purported author of both the gospel of Luke and Acts. Luke stated that his whole reason for writing was to report events as accurately as possible. So I picture him badgering the Pentecost eye-witnesses about what exactly it was like to be present in that moment when the spirit disrupted everything. What did they see? What did they hear?

In the end all he could accurately say was that there was a sound 'like the blowing of a violent wind' or what 'seemed like tongues of fire'. Along with these special effects, there was a sudden eruption of language. This wasn't a babble, but the opposite - an eruption of understanding which enabled listeners to hear their own languages spoken.

This is the essential mystery of Pentecost - that something indescribable and yet ultimately comprehensible happened to Jesus' followers.

This month we celebrate Pentecost, the third great festival in the Christian year, but one which we often don't make much fuss about in our tradition. Perhaps we have put less emphasis on it because it defies our Presbyterian attempts to analyse and explain things.

There probably aren't words, in any language, to fully describe the presence of the spirit, but this year we have a useful opportunity to experience Pentecost in a slightly different way, through a joint IDCT service at the Town Hall on **Sunday May 19**. This will replace the regular Sunday services for a number of the town churches, including ourselves. It's an opportunity to live out the **'unity in diversity'** which the Holy Spirit brought to the early church.

Sadly, I will have to miss it myself as I will be sharing in a different kind of unity that Sunday as part of General Assembly this year. But I look forward to the descriptions you will no doubt share with me afterwards!

The spirit isn't confined to Pentecost of course, nor is it always accompanied by special effects. It infuses all we do including our practical efforts for **Christian Aid Week from 12 to 18 May.**Whatever this month brings you, and wherever it takes you, may the spirit's blessing travel with you, and may you feel, even for just a moment or two, something indescribable.

Cochabamba, central Bolivia, which supports over 500 families. The recycled glass is broken up, washed, and melted down before being mouth-blown and shaped into glassware.








Karma cola is made with Fairtrade organic cane sugar and real cola nuts grown by the Mende and Temne people of Sierra Leone.

Mediterranean Hope





The Presbytery of the North East and Northern Isles organised a presentation on Tuesday 27th February at St Andrew's Church about Mediterranean Hope as part of a roadshow covering many areas in Scotland. The presentation was given by Fiona Kendall of the Federation of Protestant Churches in Italy (FCEI).

Mediterranean Hope is a migration project of the FCEI established in 2013 in the aftermath of a boat disaster in Lampedusa, where



over a hundred people lost their lives. A Migration Observatory was set up there and the rest, as they say, is history.

Mediterranean Hope is involved in other areas:

- In Bihać in Bosnia it supports a community centre
- In Sicily it supports an art therapy project, promoting a "Hear my Voice" exhibition.
- In Calabria it supports orange harvesters living in atrocious conditions, through a social hostel and a local co-op for producers.
- In Lebanon, one of the most important aspects of their work has been opening Humanitarian Corridors in 2016 to identify people from the Lebanon, who are supported to get an EU Humanitarian Visa. 1,000 people are supported to get Safe Passage visas every 2 years, and support continues for 12-18 months, after which they have to look after themselves. This has been extended beyond Lebanon to Afghanistan, Libya and now Gaza.

The talk was really interesting. Fiona emphasised that part of the success of the projects has been the communication and integration with local communities where they are set up. There are estimated to be 149 million displaced people in the world. 157 thousand arrived in Italy in 2023, compared to 29 thousand in the UK, a country of comparable size. So it is a growing problem, and Mediterranean Hope are trying to provide permanent solutions for a few of these people.

I knew that I wanted to use recycled materials and do something that the whole congregation could participate in. So when I asked Rhona what her themes were




for Lent and she came up with colours I knew we could do something. And when I asked the congregation to supply fabrics you came up with lots of lovely items that
