

From the West Manse

As I write, it is still the most changeable and contradictory June I can remember, weather-wise.



Thinking about contrast and contradiction led me to the wellknown opening to Charles Dickens' novel A Tale of Two Cities.

"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of light, it was the season of darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was the winter of despair."

Dickens' words feels particularly apt these days in a world with such extremes of climate, such a contrast between the 'haves' and 'have nots', such a pendulum swing between ever widening political poles.

This year has thrown up another upcoming contrast: 'It was a summer of sport, it was a summer of politics'. For some people one will be a consolation for the other - although currently Euro 2024 isn't looking too consoling for us Scots! However, Scotland has some real Olympic and Paralympic medal hopefuls in athletics, cycling, swimming, rowing, triathlon and shooting.

More significant than national pride, however, is the chance to admire the skill, talent, dedication and spirit of the competitors. We are often moved by individual stories of achievement against the odds or of those who demonstrate particular resilience, courage or moral fibre. One such story takes us back 100 years, also to Paris, when Scottish sprinter **Eric Liddell** famously refused to take part in Olympic heats for his event as they were to be held on a Sunday. As a devout Christian of his era, he felt strongly that Sunday was a day for worship, not competition. Instead, he trained for a couple of months for the 400 metre, ran it, and won.

His story, along with fellow competitor **Harold Abrahams**, was dramatised in the 1981 film 'Chariots of Fire'.

Liddell gave up athletics shortly thereafter and followed his parents' path as a missionary, dying years later in a Japanese prisoner of war camp in China, likely from an undiagnosed brain tumour, his death hastened by overwork and malnourishment. Even in those circumstances, however, he showed exemplary resilience, courage and commitment to others. One of his fellow internees, Norman Cliff, described him thus, "Often in an evening I would see him bent over a chessboard or a model boat, or directing some sort of square dance – absorbed, weary and interested, pouring all of himself into this effort to capture the imagination of these penned-up youths. He was overflowing with good humour and love for life, and with enthusiasm and charm".

In the worst of circumstances, Liddell shared the best of himself. And he did so because of his profound faith.


The Olympic Games have always aimed to avoid politics, wherever possible; but perhaps politics could learn something from sport. Election polling suggests we may soon have a new government in Westminster. New or old, they will be facing a huge roster of challenges. They will need wisdom, belief, light and hope. At the very least, they should be clear, as Liddell was, about who and what they are 'running' for. Perhaps too, if all seems to be falling on the opposite side of Dickens' scale into foolishness, incredulity, darkness and despair, they might, as I do, take heart from Liddell's words: *"Circumstances may appear to wreck our lives and God's plans, but God is not helpless among the ruins. God's love is still working. He comes in and takes the calamity and uses it victoriously, working out His wonderful plan of love".*


VOLUNTEERING - A regular reminder that we are always seeking new volunteers and the summer


Save the date – 27th September


