From the West Manse

As summer starts to draw to a close, and I start a week of holiday (which will be over by the time this is published), I've been very aware of the light.



To be honest I've been aware of the light - or sometimes the lack of it - all summer. Even though the weather finally improved towards the end of July after our very wet spring and early summer, we have still had quite a few days where the light has had to work to get through a haze of clouds. The result has sometimes been more glaring than bright. I feel like I have spent more time squinting this summer than usual, so if I happened to pass you at some point with a ferocious frown on my face - it wasn't anything you did!

But right now, as I sit here, the evening sunlight is just about perfect. The opening phrase of the Kenneth Steven poem 'Enough', which is this month's Reflection, feels appropriate for my mood just now 'out of the scurry of the days a place of late sunlight ...'

I've no particular plans for this week - various tentative ideas for a number of reasons didn't quite align. However, at the moment it feels 'enough' to sit in that late sunlight and, as Steven goes on to write, *'let the things still hurrying to be done fall silent.'*

It can be so challenging sometimes to allow our bodies and brains to take a proper rest. But when we don't rest we are at risk not just of overwork but of something I discovered in an article this week is called 'anhedonia'. According to the writer, anhedonia is a feeling of flatness or numbness, a loss of interest in people or activities, or an inability to feel joy or pleasure. This can be a feature of clinical depression, but to a lesser degree it is something that almost everyone feels occasionally and can perhaps be best summarised by the syllable *'meh'*.

Interestingly, while the causes and strategies to deal with it vary, three things are almost universally helpful: time in nature, physical exercise, and the company of others.

Time in nature is beneficial for us in many ways, one of which is that we need natural light. Modern lifestyles put us under artificial lighting and/or in front of blue-lit screens for a good chunk of our waking hours, especially in the winter here in the north, so we really should grab the summer light when we have it.

And yet I don't necessarily love the light when it is blazing down on me mid-summer. That's too intense for me! I love it when it is just starting to recede, on a late summer or early autumn evening perhaps, or in the gold of sunset. Late sun seems to me to carry with it a promise: of rest, of something beyond the horizon, of a new day and new possibilities ahead. In a reflection later in this magazine - *God within Gold* - the poet Stewart Henderson also provides us with words of reassurance in our troubled world.

In Psalm 65 it says: "They who dwell at the ends of the earth stand in awe of Your signs; You make the dawn and sunset shout for joy".

There's nothing 'meh' about God's kingdom, neither the kingdom which is to come or the one we can catch glimpses of on evenings like this, when it is enough to sit in the late sunlight and be glad.



FAIRTRADE FORTNIGHT: 9 - 22 September 2024



2024 marks 30 years of the Fairtrade mark first appearing on products on our shelves in the UK. The first, *Green & Black's Maya Gold Chocolate,* was launched in 1994, followed by *Cafédirect and Percol* coffees, and Clipper tea. There are now almost **5,000** Fairtrade products in the UK

alone, and the number is growing all the time. Globally, millions of farmers and workers in 70 countries are part of **1,930** Fairtrade certified producer organisations, benefitting from stable prices, community facilities, access to training and a platform for their voices to be heard.

The focus of the 30th anniversary during this year's Fairtrade Fortnight is on showcasing the three decades of collaborative efforts with farmers and workers, establishing the Fairtrade market as a prominent force in creating life-changing benefits globally.



This year's theme is 'Be the Change', spotlighting the ways that everyone can enact real change by choosing Fairtrade. The

goal is more than people just being aware; it is about them taking an active choice to support over **2 million** Fairtrade farmers and workers wherever possible, to ensure they can earn a fairer wage.

Since Fairtrade certified products first appeared in the UK, the movement has not only pioneered a unique, more equitable way of doing trade – and shown how it makes a tangible difference – it has become the world's most recognised and trusted ethical label.



Despite these successes, the global food system still is not fair. Farmers are part of a chain

in which power is unfairly distributed. They are frequently forced to sell their crops for less money than they cost to grow. **The climate crisis is making conditions more and more challenging for farmers. So now more than ever it is vitally important to spread the word, support Fairtrade producers and call for trade justice**. More people choosing Fairtrade means extra income, power, and support for those communities, as they work to build sustainable and prosperous futures.



FAIRTRADE ROCK BUNS


- 8 ozs self-raising flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- ½ tsp salt
- \circ 4 ozs butter or margarine
- 3 ozs Fairtrade caster sugar
- o 2 ozs Fairtrade raisins (available in Ubuntu)
- 1 -2 tbsp milk



Rub butter into flour and then add the remaining dry ingredients. Mix beaten egg and 1-2 tablespoons of milk to make a sticky consistency. Spoon forkfuls of mixture onto lined baking tray and bake at 210°C for 12-15 minutes depending on size. Finally, sprinkle with Fairtrade caster sugar while still warm. **Enjoy!** **Stuart Henderson**
