

From the West Manse

At our last Encounter meeting we spent a few minutes, as you do, trying to remember who had sung "ch..ch..changes". The answer, of course, is David Bowie.



Unsurprisingly, it was the changeability of the weather which had prompted the song memory. I am currently grateful for the wee bit of almost-summer which is still lingering as I write. But it has also given me wardrobe whiplash. Today I am in a dress and sandals. Five days ago I was in tights, trousers, boots, long sleeve shirt, jumper, and wrist warmers. I had also filled the hot water bottle and tossed a throw over my knees.

Sometimes it is hard to remember what it was like to grow up in a country where it was actually worth putting away your summer and/or winter clothing for a few months of the year.

Having said that, the blazing colours of a Canadian 'fall' were always a reminder that everything changes. Part of the beauty of autumn - and its melancholy - comes from the awareness that it is temporary. All seasons are, of course, but autumn wears its lack of permanence boldly.

There's a boldness in Bowie's lyrics, too, which I'd never noticed. After resorting to Google to confirm that he had indeed sung 'Changes' I discovered that I'd been misremembering a key line in the chorus. I'd always sung "turn and face the change, ch..ch..changes". However, the lyrics are actually, "turn and face the strange."

"Turn and face the strange" is a very striking line. It reminds me that what we tend not to like about change is that it is unfamiliar. We're okay, generally, with changes of season, or weather, or wardrobe because they have some predictability. We may not

know exactly what the Scottish weather is going to do on any given day, but it still usually operates within a range we recognise. Similarly, in any given year, autumn, winter, spring or summer may feel longer or shorter, but one does always follow the other. We also have the good fortune to live in a country where even if some harvests may be better than others, there always is a harvest to gather.

Changes which don't fit the patterns we are used to can feel more threatening. It's one of the reason the pandemic was so devastating. That particular 'strange' upended so many of our interactions and institutions that we are still feeling the effects in education, in health care, in so many aspects of our lives.

Churches too have been facing big changes. Sometimes this has meant having to make decisions which may feel uncomfortable as they herald a break from the past and an unfamiliar way of doing things. For us this currently includes deciding how to dispose of our church hall, as detailed later in the magazine. Do we shy away from this change or do we do what Bowie recommends and "turn and face the strange"?

Bowie was singing about artistic reinvention and of the clash between generations, but that willingness to "turn and face the strange" can also be relevant to churches.

The church's ability to hold onto and treasure the past; to provide stability in a unstable world; to be faithful and true; still matters. But we mustn't let that stop us facing the future with boldness and courage. As God says to Israel, in Isaiah 43, "Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?"

God is with us - in the boldness of autumn, the stillness of winter and all the strange unknown seasons ahead.

Mainly Music - "the highlight of my week!"

Mainly Music (MM) runs every Tuesday morning and has done so **for 12 years!** This is a group for

pre-nursery children and their parents/carers to enjoy songs,



rhymes, socialising and snacks, all within a Christian context. Several members of our congregation volunteer to run these sessions, and they have as much fun as the children!

A typical session includes songs and rhymes, usually involving actions, percussion and props. Jane Fraser leads the session and

everyone - young, old, parents,





grannies, carers, volunteers - joins in. "Woke up this morning with Dancing Feet" is a favourite as is "Five hats on my head". This section concludes with two charming, gentle songs - "God made me" and "Goodbye, everyone".





Then comes snack time, delivered to children

and parents by our volunteers, after which these fine folk get involved in actively playing with the wee ones, allowing the adults to have 20 minutes of socialising; a feature much appreciated by busy parents. The adults





are also served tea or coffee and a delicious *fine piece* from our own Acorn Centre.



We asked the parents and children how they regarded MM. Here are some responses:

Fraser loved the music and the dancing; Orlagh (15 months) would say snack time and playing with the toys.

I came initially on the recommendation of a friend who had been with her three children; now I come with my two.

The best aspects for me are meeting other parents, and also seeing the children's confidence grow.

I moved to the area and wanted a group which catered for a one year old and a three year old. This group is very welcoming and has a wide variety of toys and music, while the structure of the session is good and keeps the attention of the children.

I am now attending with my fourth child. I can confidently say that MM is the best group. The warm welcome from the team and from other parents is the highlight of my week. Everyone is so friendly and caring. MM strikes the perfect balance between group activity and opportunities for kids to play independently while parents can catch up. Some of the friends I made when I first joined MM have become some of my closest



companions.

All of my four kids have loved MM, and the current ones eagerly anticipate Tuesday mornings. The older ones cherish the occasional School In Service Day visit, seeing it as a special treat.

They still sing "God made me" as a bedtime lullaby!



Thus every Tuesday morning our Sanctuary is full of toys and noise, craic and cake, and is thus regarded as a special place to be.

HARVEST THANKSGIVING

The celebration of the harvest has been happening around the world for thousands of years. In Britain it is celebrated after the harvest has been gathered in to show that people are grateful for the food that has been grown. The term itself is derived from the Anglo-Saxon word for autumn – 'haerfest'.

The tradition was essentially a pagan festival with pagan customs. For example, the final handful of corn stalks would have been woven into a 'corn dolly'. This represented the spirit of the corn and was kept until the following spring to ensure a good harvest next year.

In Britain, harvest celebrations happen in September or early October. Celebration of the Harvest Festival in churches began relatively recently and is generally dated from the 1840's in Cornwall. During Victorian times harvest hymns such as 'All things bright and beautiful' were written. In addition, Dutch and German harvest hymns in translation (for example, We plough the fields and scatter) helped popularise this idea of a harvest festival, and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce for the Harvest Festival service.



Thanksgiving for harvest happens all over the world and in many religions: e.g. Judaism (Sukkot), Hinduism (Holi) and Sikhism (Baisakhi).

The history of Thanksgiving in the United States, Canada, Australia and other parts of what was then the 'British Empire' is generally linked with the celebration of settlers in the early colonies for the first harvests which sustained them throughout the difficult winters during the early years of establishing settlements.

While the celebrations are traditionally seen as thanking God for providing a bountiful harvest, they should also be seen as a time to thank farmers throughout the world for the part they play in ensuring we all benefit from the fruits of their labours. In doing so we should acknowledge that their task is arduous – particularly in developing countries. There is considerably more work involved than scattering 'the good seed on the land' and leaving it to be 'fed and watered by God's almighty hand' - work which is exacerbated by climate change which disproportionately affects farmers in the poorest parts of the world.



This is the second week of Fair Trade fortnight so it's an appropriate time to be reminded of the need to support farmers in the developing world to ensure that they are rewarded for their part in providing bountiful harvests which all benefit from.

HALL REPORT

It's often said that things in the church move slowly and this is certainly true when it comes to the question of the future of our West Church Hall.

Deciding how to 'dispose' of it (as agreed by our Inverurie grouping and in accordance with the Presbytery plan) continues to be a challenge and occupied a fair chunk of our last session meeting. The word 'disposal', in the language of presbytery planning, means making arrangements so that the church will no longer have responsibility for the building. This often involves a sale, or sometimes demolition.

In our case, selling is not an easy option. If the hall was sold, it would block access to our flagship community/kitchen garden and would drastically reduce what is already very limited parking. Furthermore, it is unclear whether the council would grant planning permission to a developer due to the volume of both vehicle and foot traffic already clogging the church lane. Not only does the lane provide access to our church and café, which is busy seven days a week, it is also used as the main foot passage to the town by scores of Academy students.

After considering the implications of a sale, and seeking the advice of the law department at the Church of Scotland's head office regarding how to proceed with the rather complicated title documents, the session agreed at our meeting on the 10th September that our preferred option would be to demolish the hall. This would free up the space to further develop our garden partnerships and projects, opening up new possibilities for local

mission, while eliminating the burden of future maintenance and repair costs. It could also improve parking access for the congregation. The decision has not been taken lightly, but it feels like a positive way forward.

There is a lot of work to be done, and there will be costs involved, even to establish the feasibility of demolition. It's possible it will turn out to be impractical and we will once again be considering other types of 'disposal'. However the Kirk session feels it is important to begin to take some concrete steps. The advice of head office was that the first step was for the Kirk Session to make a decision. Having done so, we want to ensure that the congregation, neighbours and community are kept appropriately informed of any developments.

In the meantime we continue to be grateful for the congregation's patience with the process. As intimated on Sundays, we would very much appreciate any recommendations of architects with whom to have initial discussions. If you have any connections or recommendations, please do let Rhona or one of the session know.
