From the West Manse

Sitting down to write this letter before heading off for a pre-Advent week of annual leave, I wondered whether I was feeling Christmassy enough yet for a festive message.



And then it happened.

The fact that we have pre-loved Christmas baubles for sale at the centre (do drop by and see if there is anything you like) and that there are already real Christmas trees in the supermarkets wasn't what did it. I love a real Christmas tree but how on earth do you keep one alive until Christmas if you buy it in mid-November? Beginning work on school assemblies, and the pop-up nativity, and this festive edition of the magazine has helped, but that wasn't quite it either.

No, what made me feel Christmassy was the fact that as I looked out of the window it began to snow. You can take the girl out of Canada ...

Snow at the moment is actually not terribly convenient for me. It might interfere with my travel plans for one thing. And so I'm grateful, and hopeful, that this particular snowfall will be no more than a light dusting. But, oh, it does look pretty. And more than that, it looks Christmassy.

Of course a snowy nativity is unlikely to be historically accurate (although at 2,400 feet above sea level, Bethlehem does get a bit of snow from time to time). If it *did* snow on Mary and Joseph's journey, I expect it didn't inspire them with cosy, nostalgic feelings. Instead, Joseph probably worried that Mary wasn't warm enough and Mary might have wondered whether it was the pregnancy or the snow that was making her feel so tired. But what feels "Christmassy" to us now, is often whatever brings back memories of childhood Christmases; those sights, sounds, smells, textures, tastes, activities, or weather patterns that evoke sensory memories of a time when perhaps life felt less complicated, or it felt entirely natural to be hopeful about what Santa would leave under the tree, or what the future of the world might be.

Is it quite so 'natural' to be hopeful in adulthood? Some would say it is unnatural. Science certainly suggests that humans are wired to respond strongly to danger. Maybe fear is more 'natural' than hope. But I think hope is one of the things that differentiates us from most other animals. Hope is not mere optimism. Hope doesn't just believe that things will work out in some vague unspecified way. Hope looks reality in the eye and yet still manages to give us the confidence to move forward.

As a Christian, I believe that hope isn't just a human attitude, it is a gift. Every year, at Christmas, we celebrate the rebirth of hope into the world. And every New Year we remember that darkness always turns again to light. As the angels said to the shepherds, "*Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord.*" (Luke 2: 10-11)

Snow may make me feel nostalgic at Christmas, but what makes me hopeful is that, in spite of everything, and even in an increasingly secular western world, people can still hear about Jesus every year. Whether it's a snowy Nativity scene on a card from their one 'religious' friend, or the sound of 'O Little town of Bethlehem' or 'In the Deep Midwinter' giving them an unexpected rush of feeling; our Christian hope, like our saviour, is still alive and active in the world today.

We are the people of hope. Let's spread that gift this Christmas.

Seven Festive food tips for reducing waste this season

1. Plan ahead. Make a meal plan and base your shopping list around this. This will help to save money and waste.

2. Prepare in advance. For the big meal do as much preparation in advance and don't forget to include your houseguests and the rest of the family in the task. Peeling tatties and scoring sprouts can be fun if you have someone to have a natter with.

3. Check cooking times and write a timetable so you know what has to go in when. This is the hardest part of producing any meal so it's time well spent.

4. Plate meals. Family or buffet service can be easier, but people's eyes are usually bigger than their bellies. Plate the first serving, folk can always go up for seconds.

5. Food Safety: First cook to 75'c and reheat to 85'c. Always cool food as quickly as you can and refrigerate once it is around room temperature. A food temperature probe is invaluable at this time of year.

6. Use those leftovers! Turkey or chicken carcass can be boiled for stock and makes the base for a great soup. Fry off a diced onion, dice some carrots and a neep and add soaked and rinsed broth mix or red lentils and you have a great meal for pennies.



7. Remember - the shops are only closed for ONE DAY!! Don't over-cram your fridge and freezers as they'll work less efficiently. Go back to step one and plan ahead.

UBUNTU UPDATE

Thank you to everyone who supported the Christmas preview evening on 4 November which was an opportunity for some early Christmas shopping with fairly traded hospitality.



The shop is well stocked with lots of gift ideas for Christmas, including:



These finger puppets are sourced from CIAP (Central Interregional Artisans of Peru), a Fair Trade export organisation which is made up of 20 artisan cooperatives benefiting over 2,000 people. The knitting is done by women living in rural areas, helping communities stay together.

The bamboo in these socks is processed into yarn in Rajasthan, India then transported and made into socks in Tamil Nadu. 17 workers are employed

and they earn about 48% above the minimum wage. They follow clear fair trade principles in their production, do not have any child labour and the staff are valued and included in decision-making processes.





Choosing a fairly traded gift helps ensure that the workers who produced them are paid a fair living wage, are not facing dangerous working conditions, and are working consensually. Giving a

fairly traded gift means you are helping someone in the world provide

for their own family and work towards a better future. It also is an opportunity to share great ethicallysourced products with



friends and families and promote the idea of gift-giving with a purpose.

their child, but many in our society seek shelter, too. A thoughtful evening for Advent, and we hope a few people will join us.




Christian Aid Christmas Card Delivery Service 2024

Please check you are not including any cards for anywhere further afield than Inverurie, Port Elphinstone, or Osprey Village, and if you could make sure that addresses are as complete as possible, we always appreciate it! The minimum donation requested per card is 50p. All funds raised go to Christian Aid.

Christmas Instant Nativities - or Instant Calamities? (Reflections of fraught teachers.)

Christmas traditions are, generally, joyful - carol concerts, carol

singing in the community, candlelit services - and for parents of young children, the annual Nativity play. Unfortunately this event - "*The Mary and Joseph Play*" - can be fraught with danger, especially with regard to costumes and casting.



Costuming can result in a flurry of Social Media posts – '*Mumsnet*' is awash with desperate pleas for help:

- I can't make her angel wings stay up!
- The head of his camel has just fallen off ...
- How do you make a costume for a mince pie? (!!)

Casting is the most dangerous area for a teacher. Given that there can be only one Mary, one Joseph, one Innkeeper and generally, three Wise Men, what does she/he do with the rest of the class? Some ideas are inventive, some are wacky. One child, when asked to come dressed as an animal, appeared in black velvet: he was a spider (which was perhaps realistic for a stable?); one flew in as a bat; another crawled in as a crab. Perhaps you recall the child character in "*Love Actually"?* She was designated to be a lobster!

Our own Margaret Sangster has direct experience of these situations. She was tasked with preparing the Nativity with four



infant classes, ages 5 to 8, totalling over 120 children! So, in addition to the main characters, there were 40 shepherds, 40 angels and - 40 drummers! Being Margaret, she *made* all the angels' wings, then created 40 flat-top

drummers' hats, 40 drums (cardboard with braid around the neck), and procured 40 sets of chopsticks! The best part for the children, said they, was getting to keep the drums!

Never mind, manic preparations completed, isn't it lovely when the assembled audience of parents and admirers gather to appreciate and applaud all the effort, and join the children in singing:

"The cattle are glowing......"


