

From the West Manse



It's hard to believe that it has been five years since I sat in my back garden on Easter morning, laptop precariously balanced on a garden chair and some books, live-streaming a solitary lockdown Easter service.

There was so much that was terrible and difficult about those weeks, and the future felt very uncertain. And yet what I felt that morning, sitting on my own surrounded by daffodils, sunshine and bird song, was a welling joy. A joy which seemed richer and more profound than usual in the midst of all that we were experiencing. I also felt surprisingly connected to all of you, even though I could neither see nor hear you.

I was reminded of this, reading the Malcom Guite poem we chose for the reflection piece in the magazine this month. The poem describes Mary weeping in the garden when, *“A sound behind her stirs. A scatter of bright birdsong through the air ... And then she hears her name, she hears Love say The Word that turns her night, and ours, to Day.”*

The wonderful thing about poets and poems is that they continue to find new ways of expressing feelings and moments that are both uniquely personal and yet often somehow universal. One of my concerns about the increasing use of AI (Artificial Intelligence) is the flattening effect it might have on the vital personal element of creativity. AI works by harvesting information from a huge range of sources. And so, by borrowing from the work of human creators, it might come up with a poem, or song, or story, or painting which has all the essential ingredients to be effective. However, without an original human creator there

is something lacking. At best, it is creativity by committee. At worst it is mechanical, lacking the essential uniqueness of 'soul' which our creator gave to each of us as creators. It is this uniqueness which draws out a soul deep response from others.

Guite captures such a soul deep moment for Mary - when she hears her name, and with slowly dawning wonder comes face to face with the impossible truth that the saviour whom she saw die is nevertheless alive and standing before her. There is nothing 'artificial' about this moment. Guite conveys, in his own unique way, the intensity of feeling which resonates from John's gospel. We feel, with Mary, the wonder and astonishment of realising that even death cannot separate us from the love of God through Jesus.


Easter insists that our God is not some distant or impersonal 'intelligence', whether artificial or organic. Our God is real, incarnate, personal. God can and does speak to each of us by name. It happened to Mary, and, as Guite makes clear, it happens to us too.

And so my wish for you this Resurrection Sunday and beyond is that you will feel God's creative, organic love rise up within and around you, ready to be expressed in your own unique and personal fashion, even as we share the old familiar words:

Christ is risen!
He is risen indeed
Alleluia!



Meet Morag - our new Session Clerk!

Morag's early life was spent in Oyne but, being involved in farming, the family moved around – Inch, Belhelvie, Findon, and ended up back in Inch from where she attended Inverurie Academy.

Post school, Morag's first degree was in Youth & Community, which led to a decade working in Lossiemouth then Aberdeen. She later studied at Glasgow University, gaining a degree, then a PhD, in economics. However with her farming background it was no surprise that her next post was with the Scottish Agricultural College, based at Auchincruive, Ayrshire, and at Craibstone. Here Morag was both teaching and researching. One element she really enjoyed there was witnessing the impact of the Young Farmers' Clubs, and the benefits that such organisations can bring.

In those days, as now, farming was subject to “red tape” and the then “Scottish Office” would impose certain legislative changes relating to agriculture. Thus Morag travelled throughout the Highlands & Islands interviewing farmers and crofters on the economic impact of any new proposals or legislative changes.

In 2006 Morag returned to Inverurie and began to attend Inverurie West. On the first day of Morag's retiral Anne Groves suggested she might like to volunteer at Ubuntu; this Morag did until Covid. Morag regards that invitation as a bonus in her life; it became a pathway to experiencing the fellowship and inclusive nature of the West. As she says, *“someone always has your back”*.

Morag attended the General Assembly in 2024 and was impressed by the standard of debate. This was an

experience she values, and it played a part in her accepting the post of Session Clerk. At present she is slightly apprehensive, following Mark & Gillian, but equally she knows that they, and Eleanor, will be there to guide and support, as necessary.

Morag's personal aims for The West include extending pastoral care to more of our elderly community, and thus is pleased to see the re-formation of the Pastoral Care Team. This support would not be intrusive but, as she says, "*would be quietly in the background providing support*" - which is exactly what Morag has been doing in her time with us thus far!



We in the congregation have already been aware of Morag's involvement in worship and in the wider church community, with her friendly informal manner, her sensible judgements and her personal commitment to so many aspects of life at The West. We wish her well and have every confidence in her new role.

HOLY WEEK



Palm Sunday, the first day of Holy Week, commemorates Jesus's triumphal entry into Jerusalem, where crowds waved palm branches and shouted "Hosanna". This marks the beginning of the week leading up to the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus.

Other days commemorate important events in the Life of Jesus – particularly in relation to events leading up to the crucifixion. The days between Palm Sunday and Maundy Thursday are associated with reflection on particular events as recounted in the Gospels.

Holy Monday – may focus on ‘Jesus cursing the fig tree’, the ‘cleansing of the temple’ and ‘the anointing of Jesus at Bethany’ (John 12: 1-11)

Holy Tuesday – may focus on Christ’s predictions of his own death (John 12: 12-19)

Holy Wednesday (also known as Spy Wednesday) is when the account of Judas arranging the betrayal of Jesus with the chief priests is remembered. In some denominations *Tenebrae* may be a feature of some services. (Latin for darkness). A Tenebrae service is distinctive for the gradual extinguishing of lights while a series of readings and psalms are recited.

Holy Thursday (Maundy Thursday) commemorates the Last Supper where Christ set out the model for Holy Communion. Some Christian denominations traditionally practice the ceremony of foot washing on this day. In the UK specially minted silver coins – Maundy money - are distributed by the monarch in recognition of the new commandment ‘to love one another’.

Good Friday commemorates the Crucifixion of Jesus. For many Christians it is marked as a time of self-guided reflection on the Passion, and in some denominations, this is assisted by reflection on the Stations of the Cross.

The cards are made in the UK, 100% recyclable and made with vegetable inks and water-based coatings. 100% of the profits from the sale of these cards go towards Transform Trade's work with farmers and artisans and the money raised helps producers and businesses to strengthen their operations, access new markets, improve their products, thereby ensuring that producers receive fair prices and have their rights protected.


